Attending Students

Individual assignments: At the end of the Course, the student has to choose two areas of research/topics and, for each of these areas/topics, she has to ask the related instructor to provide a specific reading. For each reading, the student has to prepare a brief note/commentary (that is, five pages including references) based on all inputs and insights collected during the Course and on personal thinking and investigation.

Each area of research/topic has to refer to a different instructor.

Non-Attending Students

Individual assignments: At the end of the Course, the student has to choose four areas of research/topics and, for each of these areas/topics, she has to ask the related instructor to provide a specific reading. For each reading, the student has to prepare a brief note/commentary (that is, five pages including references) based on all inputs and insights presented during the Course and on personal thinking and investigation.

Each area of research/topic has to refer to a different instructor.

Paper Format
